When attempting to catch fish, first position your net well below the pond surface. Use a small amount of food to lure them toward the surface. Slowly raise the net and close in. If the fish darts away or jumps, never stab the net at a swimming fish. Regroup and start over.

The sounds of a cascading waterfall and birds singing, not a cloud in the sky, the sun is shining and you're resting by the pond feeding your koi. What could be better than this? How about actually hand feeding them! Follow the few easy steps below and your koi will be eating from the palm of your hand in no time.



First, pick a feeding spot and set a designated time for feeding each day. At

first, gently throw the food into the water and observe, making your presence known.

After a few feedings, start outstretching your hand closer and closer each day. Making it known to the fish your hand is present. Eventually, the fish will associate your presence with receiving food.



Over time, set your hand into the water with food and slowly release the food. This will help the fish become complacent with your hand.

It may take several tries but, eventually the fish will become comfortable enough to feed right from your hand!

Invasive Spotlight:
Water Lettuce
(Pistia stratiotes)



As a floating aquatic plant, water lettuce causes problems similar to giant salvinia: it blocks light to the aquatic ecosystem, reduces oxygen levels, increases siltation, reduces suitable fish spawning habitat and restricts water flow and boating traffic. Also like giant salvinia, after it gets into lakes, ponds and slow-moving streams, it can rapidly multiply and cause severe infestations. Water lettuce spreads by vegetative offshoots that break off, as well as by seeds.

This floating plant native to South America is considered to be one of the worst weeds in the subtropical and tropical regions of the world. In Florida, it was first recorded in 1765; its introduction is linked to early shipping commerce between Florida and South America. Today, water-lettuce is commonly found in the central and southern portions of the state, but new infestations of water-lettuce have been found in North Florida's spring-fed rivers and lakes. Because of intensive statewide management efforts. water lettuce populations maintained at low population densities. Under optimal environmental conditions, water-lettuce can double its population size

in less than three weeks. Seed production makes this plant resilient to adverse environmental conditions such as freezing temperatures and drought.

Why water-lettuce must be managed: Water-lettuce populations often form large expanses of dense, impenetrable floating mats limiting boat traffic, recreation flood control and wildlife use. These dense canopies at the water surface shade out native submersed plant species and can uproot native emergent plants that are important to wildlife.

Environmental damage caused by water lettuce populations:

- + Water-lettuce mats can lower dissolved oxygen concentrations reducing aquatic life.
- + Dense populations may lower water levels because water-lettuce increases evaporation rates over open water areas.
- + Water-lettuce mats can restrict water flow increasing flooding along rivers and canals.
- + Dense water-lettuce populations produce ideal breeding environments for mosquitoes.
- + Water-lettuce populations crowd out native plants and animals (lowers biodiversity).

This species (the only one in its genus) commonly forms dense floating mats, with many rosettes of fuzzy-soft, pale-green leaves. New leaf clusters form readily from stolons (runner stems) offset from the larger rosettes.

Leaves: in rosettes occurring singly or connected to others by short stolons. Leaves often spongy near base, densely soft pubescent with obvious parallel veins; blades slightly broader than long, widest at apex, to 15 cm (6 in.) long.

Roots: long, feathery; bearing long root caps (brown coverings over root tips).

Flowers: inconspicuous, clustered on small fleshy stalk nearly hidden in leaf axils, with single female flower below and whorl of male flowers above.

Fruit: arising from female flower as a many-seeded green berry.
